






The Donahy Synagogue in Budapest is the largest synagogue in Europe. This congregation worships within the Neolog movement, a branch of the Orthodox movement unique to Hungary.






Below, a remnant of the wall from the Budapest Ghetto where Rommie's grandmother, Sarah Sebo, was held for 6 weeks. She was quite fortunate as the vast majority of the Jews in this ghetto were sent to and murdered at Auschwitz.



On the edge of the Danube is "The Shoes on the Danube Bank Memorial" which honors the Jews who were massacred by the Hungarian Arrow Cross soldiers. Please note, in addition to the bronze shoes and emotion they evoke, there are also photos, yellow ribbons and memorial candles to remember those murdered on 10-7 and also to pray for those still held hostage.



The city of Szeged boasted over 7,000 Jews in the 1920's. Today, there are 300. The Szeged Synagogue is a glorious worship space and the second largest in Hungary.
